REVIEW OF INTERNATIONAL STUDIES: CALL FOR EDITORS

DEADLINE FOR PROPOSALS: 5.00pm 31st October 2014

The British International Studies Association invites Applications for the Position of Editor of the Review of International Studies as from January 2016.

The Review, published by Cambridge University Press on behalf of the Association, seeks to publish the best research across the range of sub-fields in international studies. The new editor and his/her team will succeed Professor Kim Hutchings and her team, whose editorial term will end on December 31st 2015. The incoming Editor will serve a four-year term from 1st January 2016 through to 31st December 2019, with the opportunity to shadow the outgoing team as from May 2015.

It is expected that applications will be from lead editors and an associated team, and will identify an institutional base and support. Applicants must be BISA members and the lead editor and journal office must be based at a UK university; other members of the editorial team may be based outside the UK. It is recommended that at least one member of the editorial team be based in the United States. We also welcome applications from teams that include an associated editor based in the Global South.

The new Editor will have complete editorial responsibility for the content of the Review, and for sustaining and building on its stature as one of the preeminent general audience publication outlets within the international studies community. He or she can expect to receive over 300 new manuscripts per year and is expected to ensure that publication decisions are made in a reasonable and timely manner.

Applications must be sent by email to Gail Birkett, BISA Chief Executive Officer, by 31st October 2014. Two members of each of the short listed teams will be invited to interview on 14th November 2014. Applications will be considered by a committee comprising: Professor Theo Farrell, BISA Chair, Professor Nicola Phillips, BISA Vice Chair, Professor Richard Whitman, BISA Executive Committee, Professor Tim Edmunds, Editor, European Journal of International Security

A decision is expected by 31st January 2015 so that successful candidates have time to prepare for the transition. Applications must include the following headings:


- 1) The Team. Editor and Editorial team; description of editorial experience and experience of working together as a team, as appropriate. Description of proposed editorial style.
- 2) The Vision. Describe goals for the journal, ideas for innovations or changes (if any).
- 3) Implementation. Description of institutional and resource support.
- 4) Budget. There is financial support from Cambridge University Press that can be discussed as below prior to completion of this element; but support from the home institution is also expected.

The total document should comprise no more than five pages (word or PDF format).

Inequality remains a – if not the – concern that unites the contemporary discipline of International Studies. Its prominence has been both underlined and heightened by the extraordinary impact of Thomas Piketty's book, *Capital in the 21st Century*, exploring afresh the relationship between capitalism, wealth and inequality across the world. The landscape of global security studies remains dominated by questions about inequalities of power and the uses to which those inequalities are put. Conflicts in Syria, Ukraine and many other parts of the world have thrown a spotlight on vast asymmetries in political power in national and global contexts. Responses (or their absence) to those conflicts have re-invigorated debates about the responsibilities of institutions and political actors deemed to hold power in the international context. Those conflicts, the renewed surge of racist politics in European elections, the daily documenting of violence against women across the world, the patterns of marginalisation, disenfranchisement and exploitation that attach to global migration, and a huge range of other issues focus our attention on the place of the 'powerless' in global society and the global economy. We remain preoccupied by what the emergence of 'rising powers' means for the contours of global inequalities of power, wealth and security in the future.

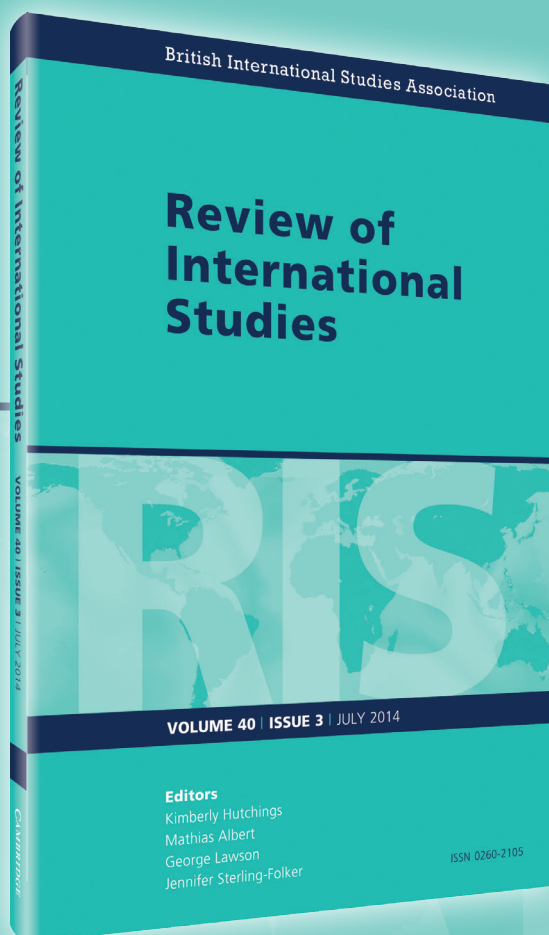
The 40th anniversary conference of the British International Studies Association will explore the expansive terrain of contemporary global inequalities, across all of the subfields of the discipline. Under the conference theme, we welcome submissions of proposals for panels and papers which address the following (and cognate) questions:

1. What theoretical, empirical and methodological innovations are needed in our discipline to understand the worlds of inequality with which we are concerned?
2. How are we to understand current and emerging relationships between power and inequality in the global system?
3. What are the connections between economic, social and political inequalities in the contemporary world?
4. Does or should the reordering of global power relations reshape our understanding of inequalities and their future contours?
5. Where are the political resources to deal effectively with global inequalities?
6. Does the sheer extent of global inequalities signify a failure of global governance?
7. How does and could our discipline accommodate attention to powerlessness alongside its traditional pre-occupation with power and the powerful?
8. Is inequality inevitable?

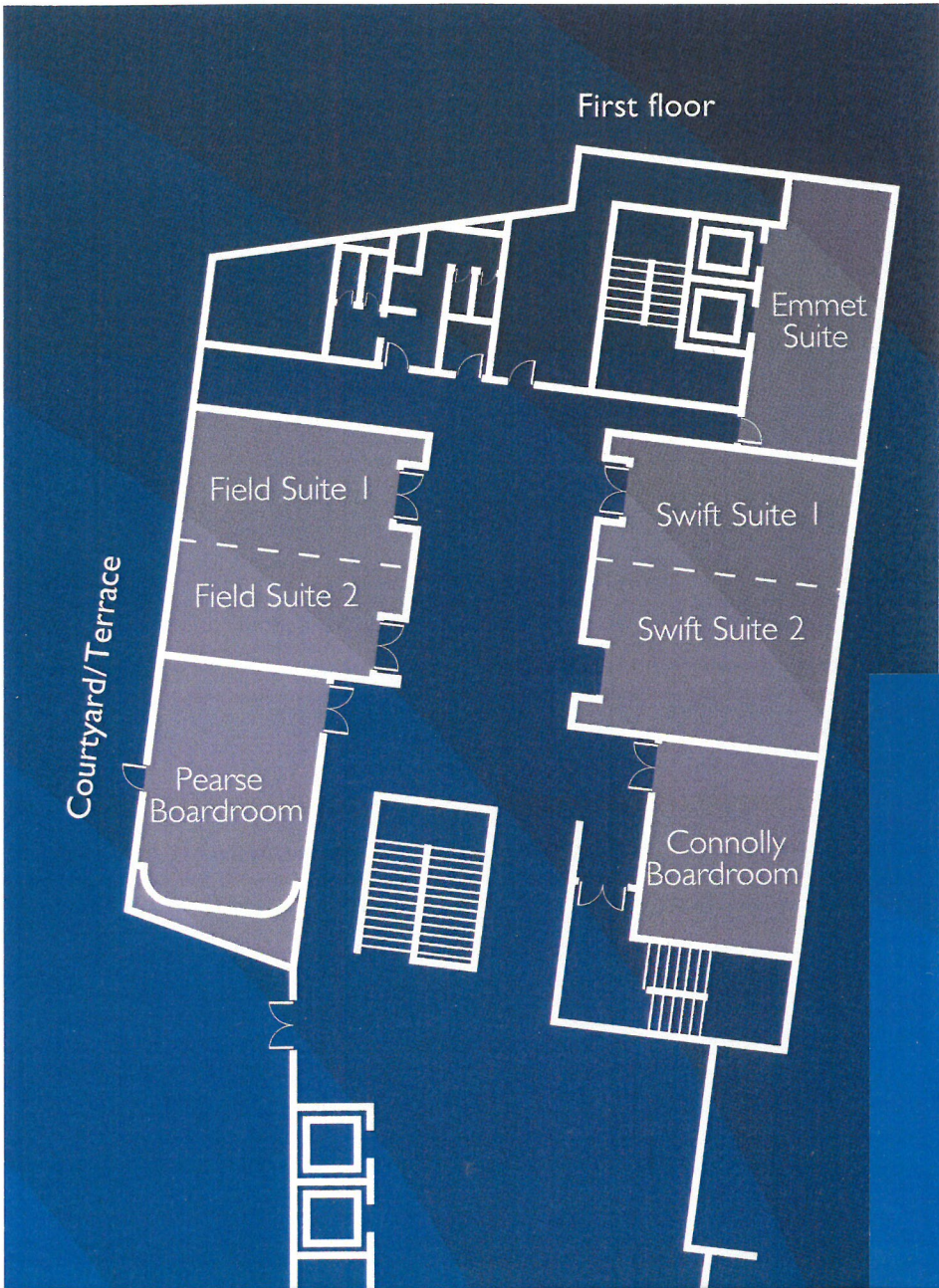

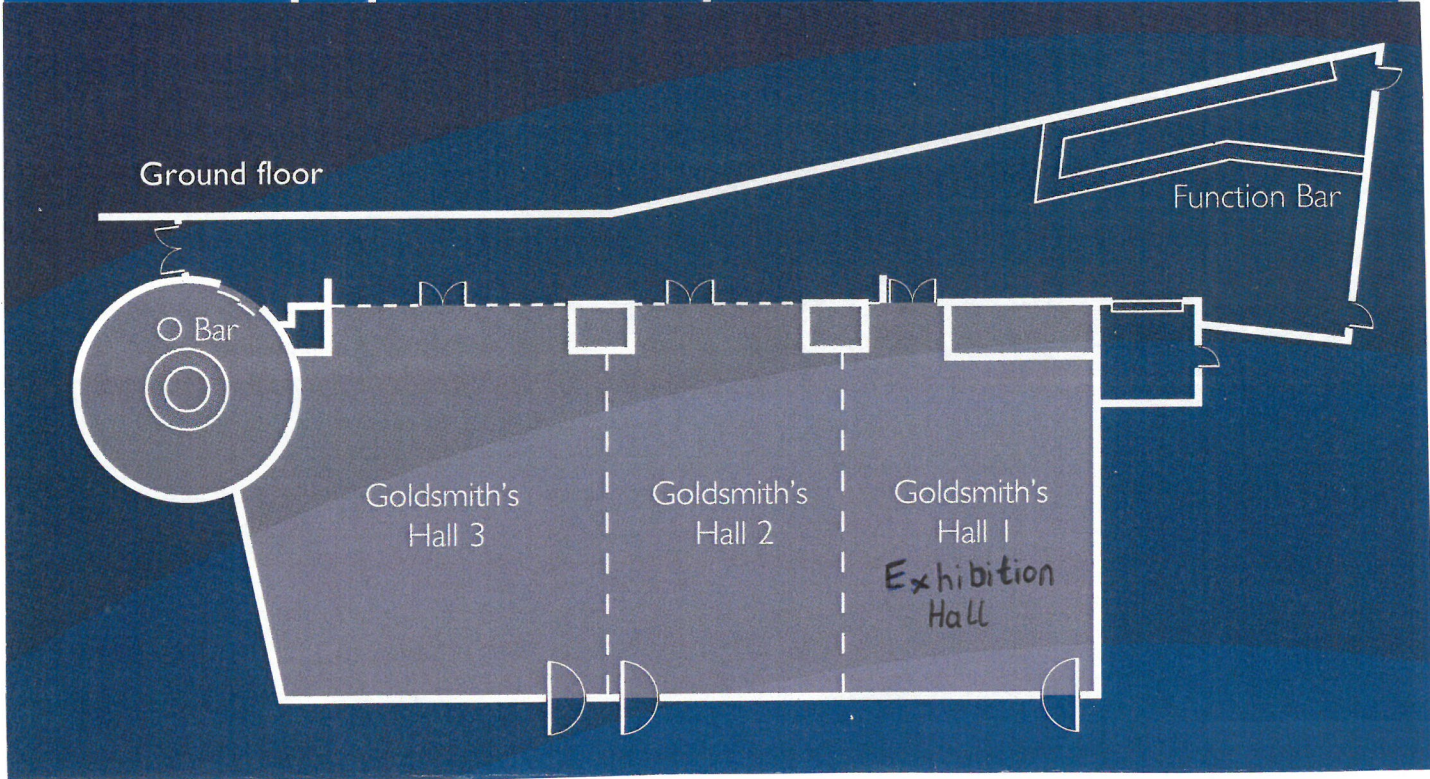

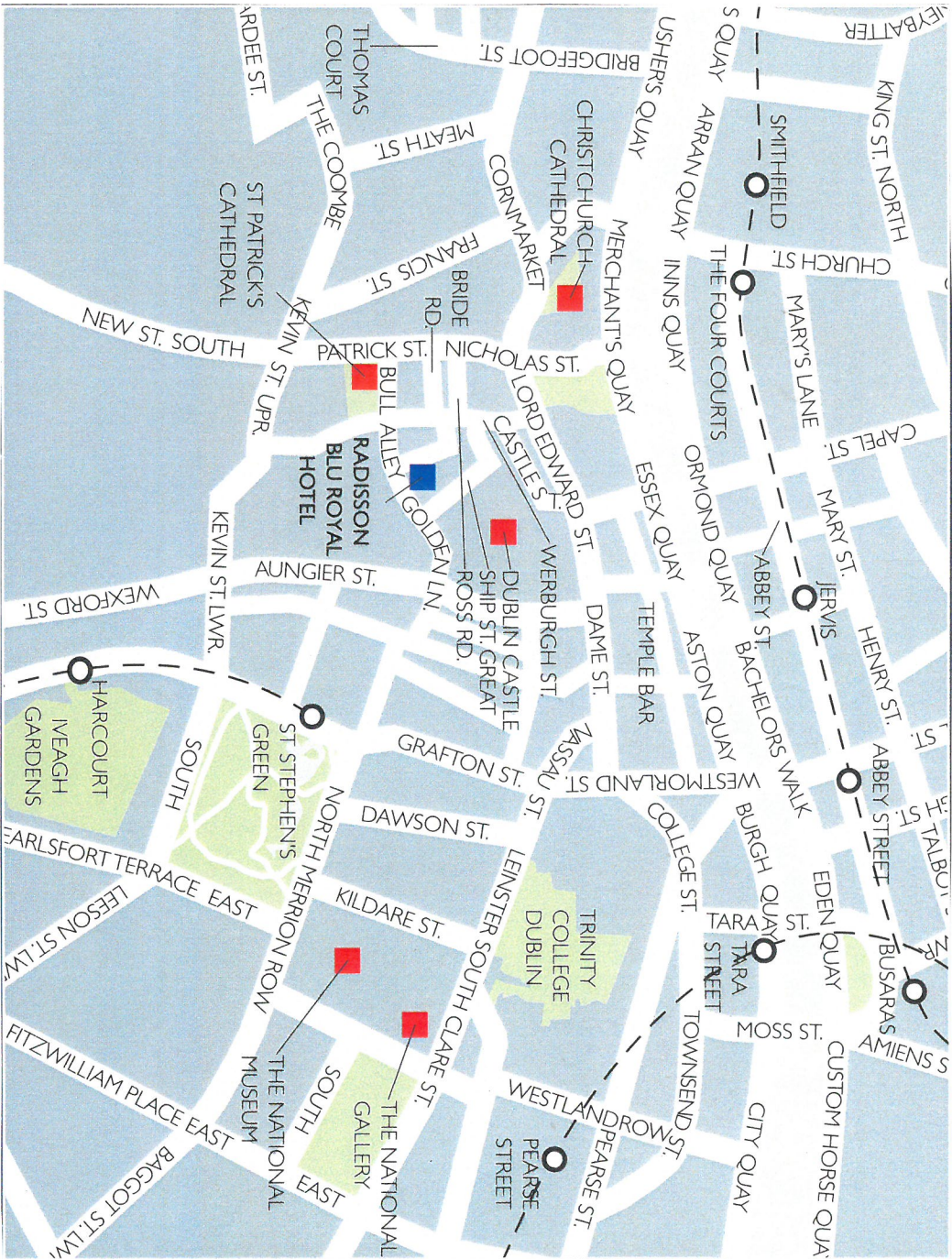
